We started a series before Lent to grow in understanding our Lutheran walk as Christians... we pick it back up here...

Learning about the "Lutheran Confessions"

The Book of Concord is a big deal... it's the book that binds us together as Lutherans. Aligning with the summary of doctrine in these writings is what makes someone ... Lutheran. As a church in the Lutheran



Church Missouri Synod, this is the grounding spot of how we share Scripture and the norms of a disciple's life. It is the driver of our practices and impacts how we operate in the world today.

"What about worship"?

What makes Lutheran worship.. "Lutheran"?

Throughout different centuries, and countries, there are experiences, traditions, and preferences to worship practices. These play out into questions about "what is appropriate... or "Lutheran".? LCMS seminary professor Joel Biermann speaks to that point... "I've got a simple straightforward answer... what makes Lutheran worship Lutheran... is when Lutheran are worshipping". There is no checklist of "this is needed... or that.." when God's gifts, His Word and Sacrament, are shared in an understandable, meaningful way... with correct doctrine... this is Lutheran worship. It can look a lot of different ways.. and that is a very Lutheran thing!

How do the "Confessions" impact this.

The "Book of Concord" is a collection of documents. In SD under "Church Usages" is stated "the community of God in each place has the right, authority, and power to change, reduce, or increase ceremonies according to it's circumstances.". The freedom of the Good News is a driving force to this. In the 1500's there were there were many pressures to influence the Lutheran Church, from Rome or Switzerland, resulting in debates about worship and conformity in practice.

It is interesting to note that the more liberal followers, wanting to appease Rome and Reformed, sought out uniformity and norms of practice as a way to compromise and show solidarity with other Christians.

Those that were more conservative in the doctrine, as outlined in the Lutheran Confessions, saw this as a path to possibly compromise the freedom of the Gospel and emphasized freedom in worship practices within good order.

That freedom is emphasized in the Formula of Concord article 10 "we unanimously believe teach and confess that ceremonies or ecclesiastical practices that are neither commanded nor forbidden in God's word but have been established only for good order and decorum are in and of themselves neither worship ordained by God nor part of such worship".

The summary point is that the Church of God... is free to develop practices, worship styles, and norms that are local to that time and place. The most important consideration is to exalt the gospel! Whatever a church is doing... it should be proclaiming Christ and driving HIM home in understandable ways so people can know that Christ is their Lord, that their sins are forgiven, that His promises belong to them, and learning what it means to follow Christ in life!

That's what Lutheran worship is all about in this community, and this time, and place we find ourselves. The Lutheran Confession are a big deal... in grounding us in this truth as we look for ways to carry out our task given in Scripture and connect and communicate Christ to a word that doesn't know HIM!
